The majority of credits are obtained within the same discipline. This degree may lead to graduate studies.

Year 1 (Prep Year)

You will attend one of Montréal's renowned Pre-University Colleges, Collège Bois-de-Boulogne or Collège André-Grasset, to help you get a head start with French immersion classes, as well as university core courses. The wide variety of optional courses offered will allow you to build your own curriculum, based on your interests.

After the prep year, you will be fluent in French and ready for the next part of the journey: earning your Bachelor's degree.

Years 2-4 (Bachelor Program)

At the end of your first year, you can choose to specialize in any of the programs offered in the Integrated Path - from Human Sciences, Pure and Applied Sciences, art and literature. Your counselor will advise you on the qualifying requirements of each program. Your classes and assignments will be in French.

At the end of it all, the UdeM diploma that you earn will attest that you have advanced French language levels along with your BA specialization.

* Courses may be given according to a particular schedule, on weekends, or on a continuous or intensive basis.

Weekly workload

A course will normally consist of three hours of class time and six hours of individual work for a total of nine hours a week.

Credits

A course generally consists of three credits.

Full-time or part-time

To be considered a full-time undergraduate student, you must be registered for at least 12 credits. Most programs are offered on a full-time and part-time basis.

Admissions

1. Verify Eligibility

2. Gather official documents (have them translated to English or French)

3. Submit application form and required documents

4. Wait for your assessment and follow instructions online

Required Admission Documents:

- Birth certificate
- Transcripts and diplomas from your last two years of high school and from university studies (if applicable)
- Language test results: TCF-DELF-DALF-TCFQ-TEF
The test must include four sections: listening, reading, speaking and writing.

Admission deadline: February 1st

Many programs accept applications after the official deadline
