Americans in Montréal

American students usually adjust well to life in Montreal, a bilingual city with a vibrant mix of American and European culture. While there are lots of new experiences to explore, others should make our neighbours to the south feel right at home.

Academic equivalency

General admission requirements for undergraduate programs

To pursue university studies, American applicants must hold a high school diploma (or equivalent) and complete a one-year preparatory year program. A student can only be admitted to the program of their choice after completing the preparatory year and meeting the admission criteria. The preparatory year is integrated into Bachelor's studies in some programs.

American residents are eligible for professional programs (Architecture, Law, Nutritional Science, etc.) after completing the preparatory year and meeting the requirements for the desired program.

During the preparatory year, students can complete a general education program and acquire the essential skills to succeed in their chosen program of study. The preparatory years offers a choice of three streams:

- · Science: including courses in Math, Chemistry, Physics and Biology
- Social Sciences: including courses in Economics, Work Methodology, History, Philosophy and Psychology
- Arts and Literature: including courses in French, Literature, Visual Arts and English

Students who have earned 30 university credits or an International Baccalaureate (IB) may be exempted from the preparatory year, subject to meeting program requirements.

General admission requirements for undergraduate programs

The Université de Montréal offers more than 350 graduate studies programs. To pursue a Masters or specialized graduate diploma (DESS), you must hold a Bachelor's degree.

To pursue a Ph.D., you must have earned a Master's degree.

French Language

Mandatory French testing

Prospective students must demonstrate a minimum knowledge of oral and written French to be admitted to the Université de Montréal. Applicants who take the exam must obtain the minimum score required for admission set by the program that they have chosen.

The score obtained on the Test de français international (TFI), a product of the Educational Testing Service (ETS), indicates whether an applicant possesses a sufficient knowledge of French for admission to a program.

The TFI evaluates the applicant's ability to understand French. It consists of 180 multiple choice questions and includes both oral and written comprehension sections.

Since the TFI emphasizes comprehension, the best way to prepare for it is to read, listen to the radio, watch TV and see movies in French as often as possible. Information about the TFI, as well as the minimum scores required for admission, is available at cce.umontreal.ca.

Students whose studies were in French can be exempted from the French test by contacting the Centre de communication écrite (Written Communications Centre).

Cost and finances

Tuition fees

Tuition fees* are set by the Ministère de l'Éducation, du Loisir et du Sport du Québec. Fees are paid each trimester, depending on the number of credits. Here's a guideline to the tuition American students can expect for the 2016-2017 academic year:

Undergraduate Level \$15,940 -\$21,023/year, depending on the study path chosen Master's Level \$7,971.45/semester \$414.08/thesis semester Doctoral Level \$7,155.15/semester \$414.08/thesis semester

Ancillary fees of approximately \$600 per year are also required.
